Secretariat Corner

"2018 A Year of Discernment"

As most of you know, our Cursillo Movement has declared a process of discernment and while we are in discernment, we have suspended holding weekends. This has been a great vexation for some and it certainly is an inconvenience for others who may want to go on a weekend or sponsor a friend to make a Cursillo weekend. Yet, it is necessary.

Over the past 17 years the society we live in has greatly changed. While we have been given many devices and computer applications to help us reach out to other people, our civil and societal communications have grown coarse and we have become a disconnected people. None of this is Cursillo's fault, but Cursillo must swim in these shark infested waters if it is to continue to achieve its goal of having more saints present on Judgment Day.

So why are we in a period of discernment?



Again, over the last 17 years we have gone from having at least two packed women's weekends and two men's weekends to barely being able to have weekends having only 6 or 8 candidates. Something is wrong with sponsorship, and something is wrong with our spirit of spiritual friendship.

If one looks out at the Ultreyas, one sees once vibrant Ultreyas dying. Forestville will no longer exist shortly because of attendance. Bowie is struggling. Assumption bloomed and died in just a few years. Queen of Peace died because no one would lead it. St. Teresa of Avila for a brief time did not have an Ultreya leader, but because of the strength of the movement in that Parish, they carried on until someone stepped forward. While Calvert Ultreva has enjoyed upwards to 30 people coming on good nights, it is not healthy either.

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And while we have mentioned only a few of the Ultreyas across our Washington Movement, all our Ultreyas are finding it hard to replace leaders and to get folks to attend regularly. Something is wrong!

The components of what is supposed to be an alive Cursillo Movement that shines forth as a gem of the diverse communities we come from is still kicking and a great grace. Our period of discernment is a time of prayer and we hope you are praying for the movement. But it also a time for us to seek to tap into the spiritual strength behind Cursillo. The gift of the Spirit that is the source of the Cursillo's spiritual strength and innovative character is called its charism. The specific charism granted to Eduardo Bonnin, the founder of the Cursillo Movement, envisions the vocation of the layperson in the Church is "To Bloom Where They Are Planted," When you look around your parishes, the pews are mostly filled with gray heads.

For our parishes to grow and thrive, the Church must speak to the next generation. Like our churches, Our Washington Cursillo Movement is similarly filled with gray heads. As our Movement has grayed up, attendance at 4th Day events, week night Ultreyas and small groups gatherings, night time meetings of Leaders School have become problematic for the older folks who find it difficult to drive at night. While day time events and weekend events are problematic for those who work or who have children. Attendance at Fourth-Day gatherings, Leader's School, and almost every other Cursillo gathering has been declining.

This says something about the vibrancy of our movement. The components that make up our Secretariat, Leaders School, the Three-Day Committee, Pre-Cursillo, Fourth-Day and Communications all need to take a close look at what we are doing, and we need your prayer – and we mean effective heartfelt prayer to bring us back to our roots of making more saints present on Judgment Day. All of this is what our discernment period is attempting to address.

We need your help to take an honest look at what we are doing so that when someone makes a weekend they really get the idea that this is a way of living one's Christian ideal and not a ministry. We need to take an honest look at what we can do to attract not only gray heads, but younger Cursillistas who can carry the Cursillo's flag forward in our Church communities as us gray heads disappear. And to form enlivened communities of Cursillistas who look forward to gathering to share in the charism that is Cursillo. We need to take a good and honest look at why the number of weekends we hold each year have gone down, specifically from the perspective of why we are only able to get 10 or so women and 6 guys as candidates for each weekend in current times.



Eduardo Bonnin envisioned the creative collision of people from all walks of life, each owning the same mission - to be the Good News in the environments they live in. This Good News is found in the personal encounter with Jesus Christ, lived out through the formation of spiritual friendships whose aim is to help others along the way to heaven. The beauty of the collision of peoples in our Cursillo Movement is the diversity of spiritual friends who willingly come to celebrate the joy that living the Cursillo Method brings, but that only happens when people willingly gather together in love. The charism of Cursillo is experienced, and to experience it you must join with other Cursillistas to empower your walk out into the desert that is modern life. Each of us sensed the love and friendship of the loving community that invited us to join in living the Christian ideal using the Cursillo Method. So, we are praying you will commit some time to join us for our discernment workshops to weigh in concerning what you think we can do to define our communal issues more clearly and talk about solutions.



The first Discernment Workshop was held on March 17th hosted by St. Andrews the Apostle Church, Silver Spring, MD where the topics were Pre-Cursillo and Fourth Day.

The last workshop was on Saturday, April 14, 2018 at Our Lady Queen of Peace Church in Washington, DC. The Topic: Three Day & School of Leaders. The next will be a "DISCERNMENT DAY RETREAT" on May 19, 2018 at Holy Family Seminary.

As a community, we can only be successful in this mission for Christ if we all join the process and work together. We cannot do this without our beloved Cursillo community. **See you on May 19th!**

Frank was easy to talk to and would always listen, then reassure the one who was troubled. Always telling them "God loves you". Frank and his wife Jean were members the 3 Day Committee back in the 70's making sure all went well on the weekends. If there was a Cursillo weekend, Frank would make sure that his Palanca got there. If he could not get there, he would ask me to take it. He always supported the Cursillo weekends with prayer.

In our parish Frank worked tirelessly visiting the sick in the hospital and nursing homes as well as shut-ins. He also did marriage prep, weddings, baptism prep and baptisms, and was on the RCIA team. I remember one day getting a phone call from the hospital when they were looking for a priest. 
I am quite sure on that September morning when Jesus called Frank home he did so with a twinkle in his eye and open arms and said, "Welcome home, my faithful servant".


REGION & NATIONAL SERVICE

The OMCC has four International Groups: Asia Pacific Group, European Group, Latin America Group and the North America/Caribbean Group (NACG). The NACG was selected to serve for the upcoming term, 2018-2021, and the among the members of this *Executive Committee is Jacqueline DeMesme-Gray - Secretary (ET), former Past Lay Director of the Washington Cursillo Movement and on the Region* ** Working Group.

The purpose of the Cursillo Movement is to bring about a Christian transformation of all society. To fulfill this purpose Cursillistas must continue to be tireless in their individual efforts to help bring about this Christian transformation.

The Roman Catholic Cursillo Movement of the United States developed a process of service to assist all Cursillistas in fulfilling this purpose. Diocesan leaders oversee all aspects of the local Cursillo Movements and provide the immediate service to the Cursillistas. Regional leaders assist, communicate and support the service of these diocesan Cursillo leaders. National leaders assist, communicate and support the service of these regional leaders.

The nation is divided into 12 regions which include generally contiguous states. Region 2 includes: Delaware, District of Columbia, Maryland, New Jersey, Pennsylvania (Eastern Half) and Virginia. Region 2 has an Episcopal Advisor; a Coordinating Group including English, Korean, Portuguese, Spanish, and Vietnamese members; English and Spanish language Coordinators, Spiritual Advisors, Service Teams and Secretariats.

Congratulations to our own LaVerne Atiba, former Co-Lay Director of Washington Cursillo Movement, appointed to represent Washington DC on the Regional II working group.

Community – this is who we are and what we do. Jackie and LaVerne are forging the way and we can move forward in their footsteps.

Are we truly talking to God when we say our prayers?

Jeremiah 29:12 Then when you call upon me and come and pray to me, I will hear you.

Saying our prayers is one of the first activities most of us were taught as small children. How many of you remember "Now I lay me down to sleep..."? We were taught to kneel down beside our bed and recite this before we climbed into bed. We dare not sit down to lift the knife and fork to eat until someone seated at the table recited, "Bless us O' Lord for these thy gifts...". But did these words really have much meaning at the time.

Were they just another nursery rhyme that we heard and taught to repeat as a child.

But once we grew older we felt we had out grown these childhood habits and left them behind like those other childhood activities.



Did we ever really listen to those words and understand what we were saying as we recited them from memory.

We grew older and we learned the "Lord's Prayer" and the "Hail Mary". We would say these prayers at home.

If we went to Parochial School, we would start our school day and possibly end our school day with these prayers. If we went to Mass on Sunday, we would recite the "Lord's Prayer" or possibly just listen as the rest of the congregation recited it as part of the service.

Yes, these were prayers that we knew by heart as children would say. They were engraved into our memory, but again did we really understand what we were saying as we said those words from memory?

Going to Catholic School there were other prayers that were a part of our regimen.

One particular prayer comes immediately to mind "The Act of Contrition". Yes, we were taught to recite this prayer at confession which if not a weekly routine, we went at least once a month. While kneeling there in the confessional did we really hear and understand those words.

Speaking of confession, let me now make one. Like many of my peers once I graduated from Catholic School my visits to confession came to a screeching halt. By the time I resumed a visit to the confessional I was able to start with "Bless me Father for I have sinned it has been many years since my last..." truth is, I could have stated it has been many decades since my last confession. With this being the case my lack of reciting "The Act of Confession" on a regular basis, I soon forgot the words.

To this very day I cannot recall the words and when I do attend confession, I have to read those words because having never really learned the words and listened to them I have no recollection of them.

If you are like me, you'll appreciate this:

"The Act of Contrition"

O my God, I am heartily sorry for having offended Thee, and I detest all my sins because of Thy just punishments, but most of all because they offend Thee, my God, who art all-good and deserving of all my love. I firmly resolve, with the help of Thy grace, to sin no more and to avoid the near occasions of sin. Amen.

Reading these words now and really taking the time to understand them, I am ashamed to say that I don't say them on a daily basis.

That is the problem with so many of us when it comes to our prayers we just learned to recite the words from rote. We never took the time to really listen to the words, nor understand what we were truly saying. Our prayers became a mechanical routine.

We were told to say our prayers before bed. so we said them before bed. We were told to bless our food at mealtime, so we said a blessing before we ate. We were told to repeat the "Lord's Prayer" at Mass so repeated the words with the rest of the congregation. Now as adults we have grown deep and steadfast in our habits both good and bad and find it difficult to change them. We know what we should be doing, and we sometimes make the attempt to change. One habit I am now trying to change is to listen to these words and not just repeat them. I am trying to understand these words and what I am truly saying. To commit to these words that fall from my lips, I must let them become a part of who I am. These words should be able to come alive in me. I must learn these words are as much a part of my living as my inhaling and exhaling. Once I have come to this point, then I can say I am truly talking to God.
