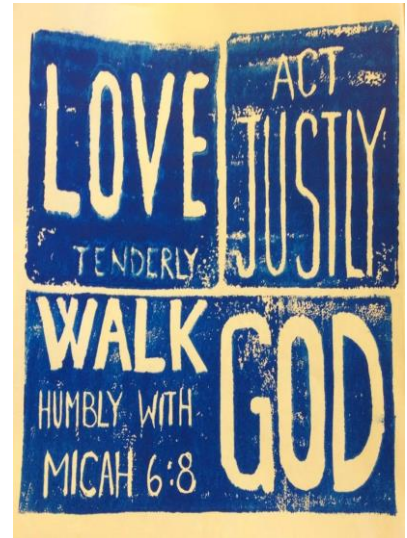
Why Discernment

At various times during our lives, each of us has had to step back and take stock. We ask our candidates to do that at the start of each weekend.

- *The meditation, “Know Yourself,” is the beginning and we hammer that notion home with the first talk, “Ideal.”*
- *What do we believe we are called to be? Where did we want to go? Are we on the path that takes us there, or have our aspirations changed over the years?*

On May 20, Cursillistas assembled to begin the process of stepping back and looking at Cursillo, our Cursillo, here, in this Archdiocese, and now, in this year as we mark more than 50 years of Cursillo in Washington, D.C.

Our visioning was led by “Lock”, Brother Richard’s boss and globe-trotting facilitator for lay ministries



Here is what we said.

- *Cursillo should be where each person can grow spiritually alive and become closer to Christ.*
- *Cursillo should provide me with a method that helps me grow in my Christian life.*
- *Cursillo should be my spiritual family.*
- *Cursillo should give me a community of spiritual friends whom I trust and who hold me accountable for my spiritual growth.*
- *Cursillo should help each one of us become God’s light in the world by living the method (prayer, study, action in the context of Ultreya, group reunion and spiritual direction).*

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We spent time on the other questions, but we were keenly aware that we need the response from each member of our Cursillo community, so we are embarking on a mission to discover your answers to these questions. We want to understand how Cursillo will function best in this second decade of the 21st century.

When I made Cursillo back in 1976, there were still many “stay at home moms”. Today being able to raise a family on one income is a dream well beyond the reach of many of us. How does the busy-ness of working, maintaining a home and family, and spending family time together change the way people respond to the idea of Cursillo? We live electronically. When was the last time you were comfortable leaving home for a day (or even an hour) without your smart phone? But friendship, the hallmark of Cursillo, lives by means of personal contact – personal, i.e., in person – not just via email (whoops, I’ve just dated myself) and text (and twitter and). How can we use modern media effectively to keep in touch across the archdiocese and still retain the personal touch of a hug or a phone call?

These are real problems and we need your help, your experience, your perspective to be able to talk sensibly about them and come to some resolution on what we should do. We talked about many ways we can work together and we’ve set out what I call a “battle rhythm” (okay, so I work for the Department of Defense), to accomplish our task.

It looks like this:

2017 – 2018

May – September: *develop and refine our plan of attack (yes, that’s DoD, again).*

October – February: *reach out to the whole community, bit by bit, to enlarge our vision and gather other perspectives.*

March – April: *have two additional workshops to understand and integrate the ideas from the rest of the community.*

May: *retreat (Secretariat, Ultreya leaders, others interested) to develop an implementation plan for making our vision come alive.*

Over the next several months we will be planning how to use our existing tools to reach out effectively across our community. Look for current information from:

- **Communications**
- **Cursillo School of Leaders**
- **4th Day Committee**

We will rely on Ultreyas to be the primary means for reaching the whole community. Each month **from October through March, we will bring the Cursillo School of Leaders out into the community using the Ultreyas** in addition to maintaining the time and place at St. Joseph’s. Our committees will be working on exactly how to do this, so if you are interested, please contact the committees. We can all be reached through the website.

Our discernment is not an exercise for the leadership. It must be a process that involves each of the members of our Cursillo family. Just as the church ceases to be church without the “UR”, so Cursillo ceases to be a family of spiritual friends without that same “UR”. Join us. Talk to us. Pray for us. De Colores!

This movement works only if we are willing to make it work.

A Pilgrim's Journey



The 17th Century mathematician, physicist, apologist and philosopher, Blaise Pascal, stated, "This, then is faith; God felt by the heart, not by reason". I say that faith is knowing that your bus driver will be able to make that hairpin turn on a mountain road in Mallorca, Spain!

This was just a small part of the faith-filled pilgrimage I experienced along with some of my Cursillista sisters and brothers a few weeks ago.

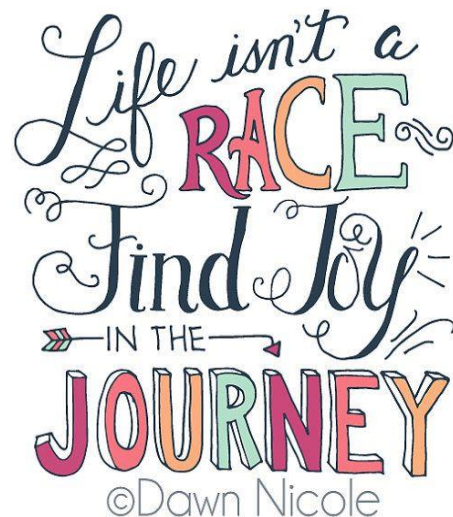
I was accompanied by **Sandy Allison-Harris, Ann Batiste, Jackie DeMesme-Gray, Bernadette DeMesme-Anders** (Jackie's sister from CA), **Barbara Hill, Pam Lawson, Faye McAneny, Kimviet Ngo, Shelley Robinson** (friend of Barbara Hill's), **Charles and Nancy Smallwood, Daniel Trinh and Phyllis Winston**. Those of us traveling from DC met up with nearly 100 other U.S. Cursillistas all bound for the trip of a lifetime; culminating in the 5th World Ultreya being held in Fatima, Portugal for the 100th Anniversary of the appearances by our Blessed Mother. We met up either at JFK Airport in New York or in Mallorca while boarding the buses. We represented the District of Columbia, the 11 states of AZ/CA/FL/IL/IN/MD/NJ/NY/PA/TN/TX/VA and the two Caribbean nations of Grenada and St. Lucia.

We had faith that we'd all make it to Mallorca, that our luggage would arrive and we'd have rooms waiting for us. God tested a few of our group with them not arriving in Mallorca in a timely manner and luggage not arriving for several days...but I think everyone had a room waiting once they finally got there!

Mallorca is the home of our founder Eduardo Bonnin and we were there to see where he lived, worked and held the first weekend. Eduardo was born on May 4, 1917 so we were also celebrating his 100th birth month and that his cause for sainthood had been approved. Wow! We also visited the church where his funeral was held and the church where his body is buried, as they are not one and the same place.



Our Mallorcan hosts invited us to an Ultreya, a fun, faith-filled event, and we heard witness talks from people who knew Eduardo and were told how much he meant to them. Everywhere we went it was obvious that our founder was a humble, simple, caring man who wanted to make his Church and his world a better, more loving place.



Our travels took us to the seashore, the city and the mountains; all while on the island of Mallorca. We saw monasteries, cathedrals, churches and beautiful madonnas.

Our 4th Day (yes, pun intended!) was one of those “best day ever” days where we went into the mountains, then down to the sea and managed to travel by bus, by boat, by tram and by train and yell “wee” as we went through tunnels and squeezed past cyclists and other buses in the mountains! We had ice cream and gelato and cappuccino and tea in a gorgeous port town.

Our faith was strong and made stronger by the idea of holding a “rolling Ultreya” when we had long stretches on the bus (and did we ever have long stretches-like 4&5 hour stretches!).

We had four Spiritual Advisors on board the two buses: Fr. Alex Waraksa, the National Spiritual Advisor; Deacon Gary Terrana, the Assistant National Spiritual Advisor; Fr. David Smith, Past World Cursillo Spiritual Advisor; and Fr. Louis Gonsalves, a priest from the LA area of California. Each morning one of the advisors would start with prayers from “The Pilgrim’s Guide”, then add some prayers of their own, sometimes a personal reflection or meditation, and spontaneous song...often started by our very own Ann Batiste and/or Charles Smallwood. It was wonderful. And when the Caribbean women started singing some of their own songs...well, let’s just say the Holy Spirit was ON BOARD! Alleluia!!

We left Mallorca on Day 5 and flew to Barcelona, home of the unfinished church. Seriously. It was started in 1881 and is still under construction to this day – what a place! Monasteries, churches, food and wine, oh my!

Rolling...rolling...rolling. The rest of the trip was all on the bus, off the bus, on the bus. And our “rolling Ultreya” was a great idea. Much prayer, song and then witnesses all along the way.

Some people had no problem at all and jumped right up to the front of the bus; others took longer to discern what they could/couldn’t say in front of a group of people they hardly knew. But I think we all knew...we’re Cursillistas, we’re friends no matter how little or how well we know each other. Faith...God felt by the heart. There were many eye-opening stories, heart-wrenching stories, simple “hey, this is how I felt today when I saw the cathedral” stories, and very deep, meaningful stories.

We entered France with a lot of “oohs” and “aahs” at the sight of the Pyrenees Mountains. It was awesome! We experienced Lourdes. The sights, the sounds, the hundreds of voices in unison and many languages all reciting the rosary, and the procession of the torches-difficult to comprehend all those candles unless you’re amid them. Some of you may have seen my Facebook post/picture with the words...How Can You Not Believe? Lourdes is many things to many people and we were no different. I think we all expect a miracle for ourselves, a family member, or a friend and HOPE is a good thing. God never lets us down-it’s just that we don’t know what He has in store for us. The miracle might not be at that moment in Lourdes; maybe it will happen later or in a way we didn’t expect. Faith. Real faith is needed.

Good beds, bad beds, pillows that don’t fluff, pillows that can’t possibly be pillows!! We had them all. And elevators built for Lilliputians.

Santiago de Compostela, the Cathedral of St. James (the Greater), the end of the Camino de Santiago, or “The Way” has been the last stop for pilgrims coming here since the Middle Ages. There are many routes within Spain, France and Portugal to reach this point and the longest trek is 500 miles.

I found out from talking with some of our group that a few of us had high hopes of just “tasting” the Camino and walking from the last way station in the hills into town and then into the plaza at St. James. We went to the cathedral and experienced the daily Pilgrim’s Mass and our very own Spiritual Advisors could be on the altar concelebrating! Some of us could climb the marble steps behind the altar and embrace the statue of St. James and then go down below the altar and pray at his final resting place where his bones are in a magnificent silver box. Then seven of us took a leap of faith and hailed a cab to the hills.



The final way station has a tiny concrete chapel and since Fr. Alex was accompanying us, he got out his “Pilgrim’s Guide” (how fitting!) and prayed for our concerns and we offered intercessory prayers for those for whom we were walking. It was a hot afternoon and for me, what seemed like such a clever idea, and a dream come true, quickly turned to a nightmare of endurance and tortuous pain in my knees. My companions seemed to have varying degrees of pain, and some none (or at least they didn’t admit to it) and some were just hot and tired but not in pain. Not all of us had taken water with us and I knew I was getting dehydrated as I was getting dizzy and had a headache. We did stop briefly in town for refreshments and a rest and then continued to follow the ever-present seashell signs and imprints in the sidewalks.

The seashell used at some baptisms is the symbol of Santiago de Compostela and the pilgrim. All “true” pilgrims wear them around their neck or have them hanging from their backpack. We entered Santiago and the cathedral plaza, not exactly triumphantly, but at least alive and able to either walk or get a cab to the hotel!

The mini-pilgrims (5 miles) were myself, my roommate Faye McAneny, Fr Alex Waraksa from TN, Bobbi LaVoie from NY, Kirk and Laurie Ann Bois from CA and Damaris Chevez from PA. Faye and I are proudly wearing our little silver seashell charm bracelets; we wouldn’t feel right wearing the “real” pilgrim’s shell...yet.

Stomach viruses, respiratory viruses and bronchitis swept through the buses all during the trip and even plagued some pilgrims a second time just before heading home. We had headaches, leg ulcers, leg pain, knee pain, foot pain, bruises, blisters, coughs, coughs and more coughs. Faith was tested.

Entry into Fatima brought a rousing cheer from all on the bus! This was the place! We already started seeing flags from so many countries and happy, excited faces. Another candle procession; a visit to the village where Lucia, Francisco and Jacinta lived, prayed and saw the Virgin Mary; people walking on their knees in the plaza to reach a beloved statue of Mary...what devotion. Excitement mounted as thousands entered the Paul VI Auditorium, waving their country flag, wearing native dress, singing “De Colores”, and all looking at each other in amazement. We’re here. Together. The World Ultreya Mass was an awesome sight. Some 100 priests on the altar at the same time! At least 40-50 deacons sitting in the front rows! Faith in action. One. Holy. Catholic. Apostolic. That’s who we were. Eduardo Bonnin would have been proud (and maybe overwhelmed).



Rolling...rolling...rolling. Our buses pulled over for a seemingly benign rest area stop but as you looked across the road-Wow! The medieval walled city of Avila, Spain. Incredible! A world heritage site and so wonderfully preserved it is. Snap. Snap. Snap. Everyone took pictures! Next, we entered the city. And our St. Teresa of Avila people got to see the real St. Teresa of Avila city and church. It was a special moment...preserved in many pictures and a Mass celebrated there. Our last Mass of the trip, so nostalgic as well as so final.

Our last day was in Madrid, the capitol, and a beautiful vibrant city. I loved the huge "Refugees Welcome" sign draped over the entire front of the city hall. And I saw "Our Lady of Starbucks" on the corner of a city street and could get my first Chai Tea Latte in 17 days! We visited Museo Nacional del Prado...THE Prado Museum, home of El Greco's, Goya's, Velazquez's, Caravaggio's, Rubens, and so much more! We had a guided tour and time for souvenirs.

At dinner, it was time for the goodbyes, the exchange of business cards, email addresses and phone numbers. Many tears and hugs were seen. It was faith felt by the heart and friendship at its finest. A real Pilgrim's Journey.
