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True Spiritual Friends

What "Make a Friend, Be a Friend and Bring a Friend to Christ" Truly Means

I believe in Spiritual Direction. You can say that I have two spiritual directors. Father Pawel Sass, who is my pastor, and a Lay Spiritual Director who will remain anonymous.

One of Cursillo's more powerful mottos is "Make a Friend, Be a Friend, and Bring a Friend to Christ". Relationship is what worldly friendship is all about, but spiritual friendship is all about getting your friend to heaven.

Those who know me, know that I wanted to be the Washington Movement's lay director for a long time. Many times, over the years, I would talk to Father Sass about my frustrations about not being able to serve as a lay director because someone else had been chosen by the Movement, and he would tell me to be patient. My Lay Spiritual Director told me the same thing. I would fume, and they would calm me down.



Then this past year I was chosen to serve as a Co-Lay Director with Cheryl Kerwin, on December 1, 2016. This made me very happy.

But very soon afterward, on December 22, 2016 I lost my sight in my right eye, while I was asleep. I had suffered something called an eye stroke and doctors said that the loss of sight is permanent. Of course, I was scared and totally devastated. Father Sass called me while I was in the hospital in Louisiana and told me that Jesus was the major healer. My lay spiritual director prayed with me and gave me words of encouragement. I thought about resigning as Co-Lay Director of the Washington Cursillo Movement, but my awesome Co-Lay Director Cheryl Kerwin said that she didn't want me to resign because she needed me. In fact, the whole Secretariat was behind her 100%. Still, how was I to serve effectively, if I could not drive? How would I be able to serve effectively with my loss of eyesight in one eye?

Father Sass encouraged me to go to another doctor because my doctor was saying things to me about the permanency of my loss of eyesight and the treatment of my condition that Father Sass did not agree with I went to the doctor Father Sass recommended but being hardheaded I also went back to my doctor. A very big mistake! I was so upset with what my doctor had told me that I texted Father Sass. What I didn't know was that Father Sass was very upset with me for going back to my doctor. I went to see Father Sass at church and He asked me why I had gone back to my doctor instead of just going to the one he had recommended? All I could think to say was that I was stupid. What Father Sass told me was that I did not trust God.

I called my other spiritual director and she raked me over the coals, too. The doctor I go to now related to me that my former doctor had put me on 400 milligrams of blood thinner. I was already on 300. I could have died. And because I did not listen, because I did not trust, my life had been put in danger.

In March of 2017 I fell, and I broke my right arm. While in the sling, I fell again while coming home. You guessed it, my awesome pastor was with me. I was starting to cry, and he firmly told me to get myself together. From that day forward, he told anyone who took me home from church he was holding them responsible if I fell.

My spiritual friendships with Father Sass and my Lay Spiritual Director have been saving graces in my walk through the challenges of dealing with my loss of eyesight in one eye. Their Christ-like love and friendship helping me over the years has been a great source of strength to me. But that is not all.

After my loss of eyesight in one eye, my Co-Lay Director, Cheryl Kerwin, has come many times from the outer suburbs where she lives to pick me up and take me to the various Cursillo events that I need to attend. She has driven many miles many times to pick me up and take me to Leaders School and Secretariat meetings, and then she takes me home. Her Christlike friendship and sacrifice are another living example of what it means to "Make a Friend, Be a Friend, and Bring a Friend to Christ".

I am still praying for the miracle of regaining my eyesight. I know Father Sass is praying for me, as is my Lay Spiritual Director. I wouldn't be able to do a lot of the things I dreamed of doing all those years I looked to become a lay director in the movement without my Co-Lay Director's many kindnesses to me. Thank you, my true and wonderful spiritual friends in Christ! If you are not in spiritual direction, consider being in spiritual direction, for it is another opportunity to "Make a Friend, Be a Friend, and Bring a Friend to Christ". That is what spiritual direction has done for me: brought me to Christ.

Edmund Madden Madden Tribute

With heavy hearts the members of Saint John's/ Forestville Ultreya announce the passing of longtime Cursillista, *Edmund Madden*. Eddie died at his home in Clinton, MD, on Saturday, July 14, after a long illness. Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated at Saint John's, Clinton, on July 19, 2018.

Friends and neighbors knew Eddie as a graduate of Penn State and an army veteran. For the twenty-plus years prior to his retirement, he worked in Civilian Personnel at Andrews Air Force Base. Parishioners at Saint John's knew him in another capacity.

Eddie's Catholic faith was a constant presence in his life. A daily communicant, he had a deep devotion to Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. He served as a Lay Eucharistic Minister at Mass and took Communion to local hospitals, nursing homes, and the home-bound. He was a member of St. John's Senior Lunch Bunch, a "money-counter," and a Fourth-Degree Knight of Columbus.

Rude Times

We live in a time when rudeness seems to rule and on a very practical level, one wonders do you fight fire with fire or do you try to take the high ground by grinning and bearing it.

As Cursillistas, if we are truly living our lives using the method, every moment is one where we look for an encounter with Christ. That would mean we are to find Christ in each moment and in that finding, manifest His love to all those we meet. Yet it is hard to remember how to be Christ when the person in front of you is yelling at you because they do not agree with your opinion no matter the issue: care for mom, politics, or the latest unbelievable news.

The world seems full of "Alternative facts," and it has become difficult to agree on or speak peacefully about current events. You know it has gotten bad when things revert to name calling and shouting has become the new normal in our civil discourse. Civility seems to be a lost art, and its loss presents a clear and present danger to our peace of mind and heart. Mark these words: "Rudeness is catching!" And it is the antithesis to the love Christ calls us to live as his disciples. There were good reasons behind the manners we were taught as kids, and it is time we embrace them again in a whole-hearted fashion if the love of Christ is our motivation in life.

Neuroscientists have discovered that when something negative happens to a person, it stays with them for a long time. We can't stop thinking about the negative things that happen to us because it is natural for us to wallow in and pick at them, as we imagine all the things we could have done, or we will do to the perpetrator who has visited this cruelty upon us. It is the same when someone is rude to us or treats us uncivilly. But it is not like this with the positive things that happen in our lives.

Neuroscience tells us that when something positive happens, human beings will generally notice it, but it really doesn't stay with them for very long. What usually happens is that we move on to next things thinking something akin to, "Ah that's nice." Recent neurological studies reveal that for positive things to really stay with us, we need to sit for a spell and think about them so that the happiness and pleasure remains with us in a more lasting way.

To really retain the joy and benefits we should get from our positive experiences, for them to really affect us and make a difference in our lives, we need to sit for at least 12 to 20 seconds thinking about them right after they happen. Otherwise, all the positive energy and most of the positive effects are negated.

Rudeness is particularly damaging because when someone is rude to us, science shows that one incidence of rudeness during our day, whether we dwell on it or not, causes us to look for and expect rudeness from others. It also causes us to react in rude ways and increases our chances of being rude to others. One act of rudeness distracts us in our dealings with other people and affects our ability to focus on what we are doing. The most worrisome effect from a Christian point of view with what we are seeing going on in our society today is that negativity and rude behavior are catching, and joy and peace are not. Joy and peace seem to be withering on the vine.

So, what should we as Christians do when faced with a rude person? What should we do when confronted by ill treatment and a lack of respect?

While there is no one way to deal with rude situations, it is important to not react to fight rudeness with rudeness. Yelling back at the person yelling at you only fosters more yelling and shuts down communications. Also, when things get to name calling there is little chance for communication. And it may be the more Christian thing to simply step away from things.

In all things we should use Christ as our model, and as the Apostle Paul recommends.... "Put on the Mind of Christ!" One place in our Gospels where Jesus gives us a good example of how to handle rudeness is found in how He handled the Scribes and the Pharisees in John 8: 1-11. The Scribes and the Pharisees drag before Jesus a woman they have accused of adultery. They want to trap Jesus. They know that under the Law the woman will be stoned, and they are hoping that He will respond in a way that will allow them to bring Him before the Sanhedrin, whom they hope will order Him killed. Jesus, instead, does something unexpected when dealing with their rudeness or incivility. He asks a question that turns the Scribes' and Pharisees' thinking in on themselves... "Let the one among you who is without sin cast the first stone." Having turned their thoughts in upon themselves, they soon withdraw. Similarly, Jesus turns the woman's thoughts inwardly when He tells her, "Is there no one to condemn you? Go and sin no more."

While it is hard for us to remain calm in emotionally charged circumstances, we can see from how Jesus handled the adulteress woman by keeping His head and not letting the people before Him rob Him of His peace. In the face of their murderous rudeness. Jesus acts from a heart-centered place that peacefully resolves a very emotional situation. So, the next time you are confronted with some act of rudeness or incivility, consider acting as Jesus acted here. Do not return rudeness with rudeness, do not fight fire with fire, but rather ask an open-ended question that turns the person's thinking back in upon themselves. Something akin to, "What is bothering you so much about this?

What is upsetting you?" Rest in the Holy Spirit and the appropriate question will come.

May God's Peace always be manifest in your heart, so that His justice and joy may shine forth in your life.
