On each weekend, Adoration Chapel visits by tables/decuria, provide sacred moments to speak, pray or sit in silence. During Adoration, we "come into His Presence."

I once worked a team where a young woman was quiet the whole weekend; but during Sunday's adoration chapel visit, she found her aha moment. What a spiritual moment that brought tears, bonding and grace!

# Joe and Wilma Koles "Doers of the Word!"

Thank you! De Colores! Ultreya! We love you!



Our Cursillo community celebrated the "Joy of the Gospel" in the fourth day of Joe and Wilma Coles on the 22<sup>nd</sup> Sunday of Ordinary Time. The day's scriptures, especially James 1:17-18, 21b-22, 27, were most appropriate for the day since, Joe and Wilma are truly "doers of the word." Our Cursillo records state that the Koles began their fourth day in 1973, but they have been living the method since they married in October 1956.

Joe and Wilma have animated the words of St. Francis of Assisi and St. Anthony of Padua as they have lived their fourth day. They have "preached the gospel always, and used words when necessary," as St. Francis would say, and while neither has a booming voice, their "action speaks louder than words," just as St. Anthony reminds us.

Wilma is the personification of that "perfect angel" that we talk about but seldom meet. Joe is the selfless servant, working tirelessly and never seeking the spotlight as he goes about doing the Lord's work. Most of the Cursillo community knows them by their work. If you started your fourth day after weekends began at St. Joseph's Seminary, Joe and Wilma greeted you at the door when you came to the closing, made your average dish look like a delicacy when they arranged the Rollo room for the post-clausura reception and said "Good bye" to you as you departed, often giving you more than you came with.



There are many in our community that have never been to a closing without Joe and Wilma. They are Eduardo Bonin's poster people for the Cursillo Method in the Archdiocese of Washington.



The good news is that the Cursillo Method has been their life. Married in October 1956, Joe and Wilma have been "Doers of the word," for most of my life.

They have served the Church and the community in New Jersey, Tallahassee, Germany and Georgia. They made Mount Calvary Catholic Church their home since 1966.



They have been faithful witnesses through multiple transitions – the parish that was populated by farmers in the 1960s became the parish in the distant suburbs and is now "Ward 9," an extension of the city. Joe and Wilma have been faithful servants through all of transition, proving that while the surroundings change, "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever" (Hebrews 13:8).


I like this small summary of their life of service: they started working on the Fourth Day committee with Bob and Sue Baczynski. They stayed on that committee -setting up the Rollo Room on Thursday nights and setting up and cleaning up the Rollo room on Sunday nights to the present day. Along the way Wilma also worked 16 weekends (all but one as an angel. Joe worked 1 in the kitchen. He preferred working in the parish as a lector and helping different charitable organizations like the Ladies of Charity. The leftover food at the closing was taken by Wilma and Joe to the local food pantry. Joe worked for the Drug Enforcement Agency and traveled all over the world, classifying drugs and testifying at trials. He retired in 1999. Wilma worked for the District Heights library as a volunteer or paid worker depending on the economy.


James said, "He willed us to give birth by the word of truth that we may be a kind of first fruits of his creatures. Humbly welcome the word that has been planted in you and is able to save your souls." In their 59 years of marriage and their 42 years of living the Cursillo Method, they took eight (8) children to adulthood and carried countless other "babe chicks" to spiritual maturity as they taught and modeled the Cursillo Method to an untold number of Cursillistas since 1973.



In Washington, we are the first fruits of the Lord because our community has grown by being planted near Joe and Wilma as they continue their work in the Lord's vineyard.







To all who were part of the Mass and Reception to honor Joe and me, we want to again thank you. Thank you for your presence, your prayers, your cards, your gifts, the music, the food, and mostly your love.



I am certain that Christ himself would have been pleased and proud to have this community of men to go forth, take His word and offer it to those men looking to gain a closer relationship with the Lord. Yes, this team has truly been anointed and blessed and are ready to go out and be the "Fishers of men" that they have been called to be.

The Spiritual leadership of this team is anchored by Father Pawel Sass, who for the first time since arriving from his native Poland, has taken on the duties as Head

Spiritual Advisor. He is truly ablaze with the Holy Spirit and will be presenting the "Sacraments Rollo." Deacon Bobby White, as one of two Assistant Spiritual Advisors, will present the "Actual Grace" and "Life in Grace" Rollos. 

Our table leaders are William (Bill) Smith "The Layperson in the Church", Charles Wiley "Piety", Mike Lillis "Study", George Sullivan "Study of the Environments" and Ricardo Featherstone "Christianity in Action." We have two first time table leaders. Willie McNeil will give the "Action" rollo and John Conroy will present the last meditation of the weekend "Christ's Message to the Cursillista". Each of these men will be the shepherd who will lead and guide their sheep so that when they leave on Sunday night they will leave not as they arrived on Thursday, but filled as they have never been before.

Stefan Abresch, my Assistant Coordinator will present the "Prodigal Son" meditation and the penultimate Rollo "The Cursillistas Beyond the Cursillo." He is also tasked with keeping this sheep from going astray when I am not following those "Fishers of Men" or the Sheep, whom we are praying will be filled with the Holy Spirit. That brings us to the last member of this Dream Team. I'll present the meditation, "Know Yourself" to open the weekend and the last rollo of the weekend, "Total Security."

I ask you to keep our Dream Team of fishermen in prayer. More importantly, I ask that you keep in prayer those lambs, who will gather the second weekend in November to be filled of the Holy Spirit.



#### Remembering Deacon Scott Stuart

There are certain people you meet in life that carry with them a weight that goes beyond the nature of the relationship you have with them. Deacon Scott Stuart was just that sort of person for me. I first met him back on the Men's 192<sup>nd</sup> Weekend in March of 2007. I was blessed to be coordinating that weekend and Scott was one of the candidates who answered the call to make the Weekend. The one thing I remember about Scott that weekend was that his presence changed the atmosphere in the room. For me, he was one of those people who exude some unmeasurable force that flows out and changes the people around them and they do this without saying a word. In Scott's presence I always felt him emanating Christ's peace and joy, and he always exuded great confidence in Christ. It radiated from him and it changed the room.

Scott came on the 192nd weekend with two other guys who by their comments and their actions made it clear they were there because of Scott. Sure they felt the call for a closer relationship with God, but they were always very clear that they felt God's call because of Scott. His caring and concern for them brought them into a closer relationship with God and so if he said Cursillo was OK. then they followed him to Cursillo. It was clear that Scott was friends with them, but he was also more than that. Scott had a clear goal in life and that was to live for Jesus and to make Jesus present for others. This meant that for Scott friendship wasn't a worldly thing, though it had worldly components. No, it was about the spiritual. For Scott, when he became your friend, you became a spiritual friend to him. That meant that your friendship always had a goal beyond simple companionship, for its aim always and everywhere was to help each other on the way to eternal life.

Scott was ordained to the permanent diaconate on June 28, 2008, just a little over a year after making his Cursillo weekend. I ran into him on several occasions as I was going through my formation for eventual ordination. Every time I would see him, I was always impressed what struck me so much when I first met with him: his peacefulness and his confidence in Christ. In thinking back on it as Ginger and I were driving to Scott's viewing, it dawned on me that it was Scott's peace and his confidence in Christ that planted a seed in me to begin considering a call to the permanent diaconate. I told Suzanne, his wife this when I saw her at the church.

In the intervening years since Scott's ordination he had both good times and bad times. Among the bad was a diagnosis concerning brain cancer, which I understand was in remission. But a lot of good has happened as well.

At the viewing there among the pictures of his family were shots showing him walking one of his daughters down the aisle of the church to give her away at her marriage. There were pictures of him on the altar giving a homily, of baptizing different grandchildren, performing a marriage, and hosts of pictures frolicking in the water with his children. In all of these there was great joy and great peace, all precious gifts from God. All these things in these pictures Scott could do because he said yes to God. Scott was a convert to Catholicism. He eventually came to the idea of serving as a deacon through his work in his parish's RCIA program. In the gift of giving of self, Scott came to more clearly see how he could give even more by becoming a permanent deacon. Our friend Scott was many things: Father, Husband, Friend, but in all these things he made them into sacred moments by aiming them in big and small ways at being a chance to encounter the love of God. Encountering Christ through the love you show others is what Cursillo is all about. So we remember our friend Scott, who to the best of his ability always brought Christ to fore in his life one sacred moment at a time. Let us pray for Scott's eternal rest in the Sacred Heart of Jesus, but let us also pray for Scott's wife Suzanne and their seven children - may Almighty God comfort them in the their grief for Scott and may He resurrect in a special way in each of their hearts the peace and joy that Scott so much lived out so truly in the heart of his faith during his life.



# FROM NATIONAL ENCOUNTER TO SHARING THE LOCAL ENCOUNTER

Everyone from our Archdiocese of Washington could not make the National Encounter so I wanted to share the best of the National Encounter with my local



community. The gift of the encounter is seeing that the our Church is the many gifts and one spirit about which St. Paul wrote - it is young and mature, ethnically and geographically diverse, inclusive and gracefilled. If you are reading this note, you are an integral part of this great Church, Christ's pilgrim church on earth. We are on our way to manifesting the kingdom in the places where we live, work and worship. More good news - we need not attend the National Encounter in order to be Church: we need only to share the local encounter so that new folk will come to know the risen and living Christ through us, and we might come to know Christ better as we search for him in others and discover his depth within us.



I have one big existential question that was answered many times over in the witnesses of the National Encounter. The question: How does my action build God's community? A few good answers from National Encounter witness talks follow: I will start with the big ones from Ralph Martin's opening talk: our "Call to Holiness." our "Church as Communion of Love and our quest "Rediscover the Power of the Spirit (within)." In the hustle and bustle of our daily lives it is very easy to move from one event to the next without giving a thought to our call to be holy and our capacity to answer the call. And, when we are at our best and people meet our small group, our parish community or our circle of friends, they don't see us but the living Christ embodied in our Church community.

When we are Church, people meet the Christ who fulfills the Isaiah 61 prophecy, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me because he has anointed me." You and I are anointed just as Christ is anointed; use the Spirit to bring God glory.

Father John Myers did not sing but he spoke the message of Yolanda Adams' song, THE BATTLE IS NOT YOURS; IT'S THE LORD'S. When we attempt to own the battle we lose because we fail to rely on the one who already achieved the victory, Jesus! How can we lose? We have two challenges in our prayers – not knowing the will of God, and knowing the will of God, but choosing another way. Either option is a dead end, but that does not stop us from going there. Trust me; I have been there. When we chose the way that is not HIS will, we fall into the age-old trap and classic problem: "The problem with self-made men is that they worship their creator." On some occasions we make the transition from disciple to demigods, which lead to demise, because HIS ways are different from our ways. Remember that "heaven is an acquired taste; so is faith." Pray, discern and God will share HIS will with you.

The third gem I will share is from the youngest witness, Walter Benavides, who spoke about barriers to the abundant blessings of living our faith in the fourth day. The first barrier is Pride/Ego or Father John's self-made man in action saying, "I did it my way," which in turn causes us to forget that JESUS is the way! The second barrier is Laziness or forgetting "seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened." It starts with thinking that God is coming to my house so I don't have to go to HIS. Or, why should I show up for Group Reunion or Ultreva or Sacraments when I can get my groove on with God in the solitude of my favorite corner in my house (all by myself). Last it is forgetting that we are the fulfillment of the Isaiah 61 prophecy, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me because he has anointed me." We do what John or Judy does; we conform to someone else's routine which is tantamount to suppressing our gifts so we can be live everybody else.

God did not call you to be John or Judy (forgive me, if you are John or Judy); be the one God called you to be.

God's message to us is the chorus to the Coast Guard anthem: "We're always ready for the call." This is a reminder to stay connected to the Vine and in the care of the vine dresser, no matter how good the fruit looks. Since "THE BATTLE IS NOT YOURS; IT'S THE LORD'S," why not pray, discern and let God share HIS will and HIS way with you?

When it comes to the fourth day, recall these words from the last book of the Bible: "They defeated him by the blood of the lamb and the power of their testimony; love of life did not deter them from death." There is nothing to the fourth day until you witness to it when you encounter brothers and sisters. It is the local encounter that matters. What to have the good life that was shared at the National Encounter? The message of the National Encounter was very simple. The joy is in the action; the action is sharing the local encounter. This is not all of the National Encounter, but enough for you to "taste and see the goodness of the Lord."

Let me leave you with two last words – ULTREYA and AMEN!


