OPEN FORUM YIELDS A WEALTH OF IDEAS



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Following are points and comments from the Open Forum held at St. Joseph's in Largo on June 16th. In the many years I have attended Open Forums, this was by far the best-attended and most constructive and positive forum. The evening started with Gisela Victoria's meditation and artistic presentation of The Figure of Christ.

After introductions of the members of the Secretariat and a brief summary of what each committee is responsible for, the first comment was a "Thank You" from one of the attendees

Comment: When teams are being selected by the coordinators, the coordinator running the earliest weekend should pick their team before the next coordinator. Responses: This is generally how it should work, though we are not always able to convince all coordinators of this. Another person recommended that the selecting Coordinators could gather in group reunion to prayerfully reflect and discuss their thoughts about the composition of their teams. Another thought was to go to a "football draft" form of team selection. This way all coordinators would get together and pick their teams at the same time. The 3-day committee will take these issues under advisement.

<u>Comment</u>: A question was raised as to whether team members should be asked in what role they would like to serve on a team. <u>Response</u>: Discussion followed with pros and cons for each; however,

there was no definitive conclusion. This topic will be discussed by the 3-day committee.

Comment: It was suggested that all angels/shepherds on a weekend should keep their cell phones on, perhaps on vibrate. Response: It is important that the team Liaison know how to reach the team, preferably having one angel/shepherd as contact; and that angel/shepherd may keep his/her phone on. Note: There will always be times during a weekend when all phones are off (i.e., during liturgies, services, chapel visits, etc.) It is the responsibility of the Liaison and Head Angel/Shepherd to coordinate this issue. This will be emphasized at future coordinator workshops.

<u>Comment</u>: The web page is difficult to read by those with color-blindness and/or weak sight and perhaps the contrast can be enhanced and/or the print made larger. <u>Response</u>: The Communications Committee will work on this issue.

Comment: A question was raised about how to rekindle the Spirit in an Ultreva. Response: Holding a Cursillo Day of Awareness at your parish is an option. Some participants described and discussed the benefits of such. Another option presented was to attend the Ultreya Leaders' Workshops where ideas are brainstormed and successful methods shared among Ultreya leaders. Another person shared the success he had in forming a group reunion of inactive Cursillistas at his parish with the hope of bringing them back to Ultreya; while another mentioned that she uses e-mail to keep the STA Ultreva informed and involved.

Other responses included having Ultreya leaders mail notices prior to Ultreya reminding members of the date/time and noting who the Witness Speaker will be, as done in the Calvert County Ultreya. They also follow up with a recap emailed to members after each Ultreya. Not mentioned in the larger group, but later shared was the success the Calvert Ultreya had by trying a different gathering night.

Comment: A babe chick, asked if there were ways that Cursillo could make it easier for babe chicks to become involved and part of the whole community. Response: The obvious method is attending Ultreya, getting into a group reunion and attending Cursillo functions. It was noted that not all babe chicks are given MaryAnne Upright's prayer request e-mail and perhaps that is something to add to info given to new Cursillistas. (My personal note—babe chicks seem overwhelmed by the info given them on Sunday and perhaps their sponsor with the help of their Ultreya leader and the 4th Day Committee should follow up with them a little later and give out that information.)

Comment: The Josephite Seminary is not really disabled-user friendly and that should be an important issue for future locations. Response: Beginning with the 2011 weekends, we will move to the Washington Retreat House, and this will not be an issue. For the fall weekends, sponsors and team need to keep that in mind. (Note: On one weekend the angels were unable to use the wheelchair lift because they didn't have the key. They should have been made aware that they should ask Brother Thomas (or another point of contact from the Josephite community) for the key. This would remedy the situation.)

<u>Comment</u>: It was suggested that we use the term "community" instead of "table" on and after the weekends. <u>Response</u>: All in attendance felt that this would only create confusion between older and newer Cursillistas, as well as, between the weekend community and the "larger Washington community." Further, it could create a "disconnect" with recognizing the Regional and National Secretariats as part of our larger Cursillo community.

<u>Comment</u>: It was recommended that Ultreyas sponsor a Cursillo Day of Awareness on a

quarterly basis. Response: Cursillo Days of Awareness should be initiated at the Parish/Ultreya level with the Secretariat providing its full support. There are certain methods for running these Days that have been successful. The 4th Day Committee will write an article explaining and describing the methods in order to benefit any Ultreyas considering having them.

Comment: We should have a presentation on Cursillo that potential Cursillistas could view before making a weekend. Responses: (1) that is the purpose of inviting potential Cursillistas to Ultreyas before the weekend, (2) there is a pamphlet that can be obtained from the Communications Committee (very small, about \$3 in cost) that describes Cursillo – Cursillo – What is it? and (3) there is a trifold on the web page that can be printed out that beautifully lays out information about Cursillo.

Comment: The name "Cursillo School of Leaders" could be changed to alleviate confusion (i.e., school/graduation versus ongoing formation) and reinforce that it is for all Cursillistas. Response: The Washington Movement is part of a larger national movement and we must be careful not to fall out of grace with National. We cannot go afield from National because we are part of them. Changing names may lead to too much confusion, etc. It was decided that we will try to better explain what the School of Leaders is and who it is for.

Comment: An idea for fundraising was presented to make blank note cards from the various weekend Banners. Another person added that perhaps we could do cards of posters from the weekends also. Response: This was very favorably received as an idea for cards for Palanca notes, etc. (Note: Later that evening a new cursillista volunteered his photography skills for this project and the info was given to Gwen Sutton.) It was also noted that any other ideas for fundraising should be passed on to your Ultreya leaders, Gwen Sutton or George and Sandy Sullivan.

<u>Comment</u>: Although Coordinators at the Closings tell the new sisters/brothers that we do not want their thanks, when these new sisters/brothers get up to witness, we should not (rudely) yell out at them when they slip and say "thank you."

<u>Response</u>: We are a Eucharistic (thanksgiving) community and we, as cursillistas, must not lose

sight of this. It was agreed that the Communications Committee will put something about this in the 4th Day Newsletter before the next weekends.

Comment: It was wonderful joining together with the Spanish, Korean and Vietnamese Cursillo groups for the Pentecost Mass and Celebration. There were also many Vietnamese who attended the Spanish Cursillo's 500th Ultreya Anniversary event. It was suggested that we should meet together more often. Response: All agreed, and it was mentioned that that was the reason the Pentecost gathering was reinstated. Further it was noted that there will be a Grand Ultreya in the fall joining all Language groups again. More information will follow when a date and place are determined.

Focus Article

I WAS SEEING RED!

Usually when we hear someone saying, "I was seeing red," it's a pretty good indicator that they were mad. This time though, I was literally "seeing red!" A sea of red vestments—all around us was red! I was at the Pentecost Mass, the Washington Cursillo's Multi-Cultural Celebration of that glorious feast marking the descent of the Holy Spirit; and there up on the altar were our six concelebrating priests - looking gloriously red in their bright red vestments. The celebration was at Our Lady of Vietnam Church, and sitting there in the midst of such great beauty, you couldn't help but feel your spirit elevated. Adding to the beauty all around me were the people in their wonderfully colored native dresses - individuals of all races, men. women and children. All lovely, decked out in the colors of the rainbow — delightful!

Back in 1999 when I first became a Cursillista, the Washington Movement was holding regular Pentecost Celebrations. However, the Archdiocese changed all that when they chose Pentecost Sunday to bring together all the movements within our wonderful Church at the National Shrine to celebrate the many

spiritual charisms these movements represent.

For several years I longed to have back our wonderful Pentecost celebration. It gave us a particularly joyous and wonderful occasion bringing together the various language groups within Cursillo. Around the time of the feast of Pentecost, I often thought wistfully of the spiritually uplifting experiences of our Pentecost Mass celebrations, and the chance to gather with other folks from the different nationalities and celebrate our Cursillo connection. Also, I took a little selfish pleasure in remembering the most delicious food everyone brought to these celebrations. I never knew what I was eating, but it was all fabulous!

When Stefan and I agreed to Chair the 4th Day Committee two years ago, we set several goals, one being to try to re-establish the Cursillo Pentecost celebration. With lots of help from our lay director, Jackie, and a great deal of assistance from many other Cursillistas in all the language groups, we were able to begin what we hope will be many more years of celebrating our many colors together on Pentecost Sunday.

A particularly joyful and eye-opening moment came for me at this year's Pentecost Mass when we all sang DeColores! Sitting among about 150 Cursillistas from the four language groups, Msgr. East, during his homily had us join in song. As only Msgr. East can do so marvelously, he had each of the language groups singing the first verse of DeColores in our individual languages.

As this was happening, I felt a little like I was at the original Pentecost, surrounded, as the apostles must have been, with people of differing cultures and foreign tongues, speaking out in their native tongues, but being understood! Here we were singing in our different tongues, and I could understand the English, but I was also hearing Korean, Spanish and Vietnamese versions of DeColores! I knew what they were saying because we were singing it too! It really felt

like our Catholic Church was truly catholic and universal that Sunday! And the music was just a little bit of heaven!

As wonderful as our English speaking choir and musicians were, we were bowled over by the enthusiastic Spanish choir and the beautiful Vietnamese voices. All I could do was say WOW!

When the Mass was over, it was time for the repast, and this did not disappoint! Before me were dishes beyond number, food offerings from the different members of the Korean, Vietnamese, Spanish and English Cursillo groups, most of which I had no name for or any idea of what they were, but oh so delicious!

My memories of the Pentecost feasts past came true before my eyes! Our gracious hosts, the Vietnamese Cursillistas of Our Lady of Vietnam, put out a spread that hardly left room for any other food! All who were sitting at my table agreed, even when we still weren't sure what we were eating, that it was beyond delicious! So good, in fact, that I went out last week and bought a Vietnamese cookbook—and have begun looking for interesting pot-luck contributions I can make in future years!

Stefan and I would like to thank all who helped to make this occasion happen and to all who came and participated. And most of all we would like to thank our Lay Director, Jackie, for being so supportive of putting back together our Movement's Pentecost Celebration! To those who missed it, I suggest you pull out your 2011 calendars now and put Pentecost Sunday, June 12th, down in RED!

OPEN FORUM A SUCCESS

The Washington Cursillo Movement's Open Forum was held at the School of Leaders on June 16, 2010, at St. Joseph's Church in Largo, Maryland. Thirty-eight of our sisters and brothers were given the opportunity to express their views or listen to what others had to say.

Gisela Victoria centered our minds and hearts with a stirring vocal and visual presentation of The Figure of Christ meditation. By so doing, Brother Jesus was in our midst in a movingly profound way.

Members of the Secretariat sections (Pre-Cursillo, Three-Day, Fourth Day; Communications; Treasurer; Fundraising; School of Leaders; Lay Director and Secretary) introduced themselves by briefly explaining their committee responsibilities. Membership on the various committees is always open and sign-up sheets were made available.

The floor was then opened for the main purpose of the forum - questions and comments. Most of the concerns were generally about the weekend and Ultreva. Thoughts about the three-day weekend included: team selections for upcoming weekends; if team members should select their preferred talk or role; cell phone availability of the angels/shepherds; use of the term "community" instead of "table" during and after the weekend, and being mindful of not yelling out to the babe-chicks when they say "thank-you" during the closing. As with any movement, there is always room for growth, and ideas were given for reenergizing the inactive Cursillistas in our parishes; living our sponsorship and team commitment to walk with the babe-chicks throughout their first year, and encouragement was given to the Ultreyas to host Cursillo Days of Awareness on a rotating quarterly basis.

Other suggestions included a presentation about Cursillo to prospective candidates, changing the name of the School of Leaders because it is misleading and raising funds by selling note card depictions of the banners and posters from various weekends.

All issues were respectfully heard and responses will be forthcoming for the issues taken under advisement by the Secretariat. All agreed that the Open Forum should be held again next year. However, as co-chairs of the School of Leaders, we welcome hearing from you at any time.



We are located minutes from Interstate 695, making us an easy destination for those traveling from Baltimore, Washington, DC, Northern Virginia, Western Maryland, Delaware and Southern Pennsylvania.



From points south:

Take I-95 North to the Baltimore Beltway I-695
West toward Towson. Take exit #21 (MD-129/Park Heights Ave.). Turn left at light at top of ramp onto Park Heights Ave. Follow Park Heights through traffic light at Hooks Lane (you will pass a synagogue on the right). Continue for about 3/10 mile and turn into the first driveway on the left.

Follow the driveway, staying left at the fork, passing through two white entrance posts. The Monastery is the large U-shaped building on the left at the top of the driveway. Follow the signs for parking and Retreat Center entrance behind this building.

From points north:

Take I-95 South to the Baltimore Beltway I-695 toward Towson. Take exit #21 (Stevenson Rd./Park Heights Ave.). At the top of the ramp turn left onto Stevenson Rd. At light, turn right onto Radio Tower Dr. At next light, bear right onto Park Heights Ave. Follow Park Heights through traffic light at Hooks Lane (you will pass a synagogue on the right). Continue for about 3/10 of a mile and turn into the first driveway on the left.

Follow the driveway, staying left at the fork, passing through two white entrance posts. The Monastery is the large U-shaped building on the left at the top of the driveway. Follow the signs for parking and Retreat Center entrance behind this building.
