
Nine years ago, I was in the midst of intense training in preparation to run my first marathon. I learned very early in that process that my ability to run long distances was directly related to the proper combination of rest, nutrition, and hydration. The prophet Elijah was on a journey to the "mountain of God" at Horeb. His energy seemed to be totally sapped. He prayed for death; but twice an "angel of the Lord" provided him with food for the journey. Jesus recalled for his fellow Jews that God had fed their ancestors with *manna* to enable them to complete their journey to the "Promised Land." He went on to say about himself:

"I am the living bread that came down from heaven: whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world." (John 6:51)

One of the key assertions of our faith is the fact that at every Eucharist we receive the "real presence" of the living God; but even more powerful is the realization that the saving action of God in human history is made present and transforms us here and now. Father Ronald Rolheiser put it this way:

"What the Eucharist makes present is not an iconic Christ to be adored and even consumed, but the reality of Christ's dying and rising as an event within which we are invited to participate."

(Rolheiser, One Great Act of Fidelity, p. 59)



At this time of year for twenty-two years, I have been recalling vividly the passing of my father. He died after three weeks in hospital on August 11, 1990. Five years later (to the day), my mother's eldest brother died; and ten years later their sister passed away on August 10. Every week, I am reminded of the recently deceased and of those in particular need of healing. The Passion of Christ is not a distant reality; nor is His resurrection! Every time we come to the Mass, we are there with the beloved disciple and Mary at the foot of the cross; we are also with Mary Magdalene as she encounters the Risen Lord! The "Paschal Mystery" is "made present!"

The Greek word for this kind of "memory" which is a "making present" is *anamnesis*. We have an obligation to participate in the Eucharist on Sundays and Holy Days; otherwise, we might forget God's love and fall into despair (as almost happened to the prophet Elijah). The opposite of *anamnesis* is *amnesia*!

"BARBARA ADAMS— A GREAT LADY"

I am writing this article in tribute to a Great Lady of this Cursillo® Movement. Barbara gave her heart and soul to the Cursillo® Movement for a long time. She was Coordinator of two Cursillo® Weekends and was Chair of School of Leaders. She saw a vision in me and she had me trained as an Angel under the guidance of the late Jan Gielda. When she asked me to be on her team and told me that she wanted me to train as an Angel, I asked her "if she had lost her mind." (You all know how crazy I can be.) Only she and Brother Jesus knew what they had in mind. Barbara worked at least twenty teams or more. We all went to Barbara for advice because we knew that she knew everything about Cursillo®.

Msgr. East was very blessed to do the homily at her funeral as he was blessed to do the homily at her husband Homer's funeral twenty four years ago. He stated at the funeral that her two boys were raised in the Cursillo® Movement because they were right there with their parents at Cursillo® events.

Barbara was born in Washington, D.C. on January 25, 1938. She attended Harrison Elementary School, Garnet Patterson Junior High and received her high school diploma from Dunbar Senior High School in June 1956.

Later, to set the example for her children, she successfully pursued and earned a diploma through the Washington Saturday College and earned credits from Prince George's Community College.

On February 17, 1962, she married the love of her life, the late Homer W. Adams, Jr, at St. Augustine Catholic Church, in Washington, D.C. From this union, two children were born: Keith and Michael. In addition she is survived by four grandchildren. She was pre-deceased by one grandson.

Barbara's spent more than 30 years of her professional career in the D.C. government advancing to the Supervisory level of the Data Processing Unit of the D.C. Police Department Headquarters. She retired early in 1993 to focus on her family and volunteer work at Providence Hospital.

Barbara's family established a legacy of service. Which she continued as she lived her Catholic Faith, while attending St. Augustine and Assumption Catholic Churches in Washington, D.C. and St. John the Baptist de la Salle Church in Chillum, MD, and Covenant Community of Jesus the Good Shepherd Catholic Church in Owings, MD. She was a regular participant in the Washington area Cursillo® Movement's women's retreats.

She supported her late husband's men's retreats as well. Barbara was also active in community service, volunteering on election boards and National Night Out events in Lewisdale, MD and later in North Beach, MD. Barbara supported her sons' academic and athletic activities by attending Parent Teacher Association and school meetings and their athletic events. Later, she would attend and support her grandchildren at their school and athletic events. The Redskins and Jeopardy were appointment TV times for Barbara. Occasionally, those events may have been the only time when Barbara took some time for herself, slowing down from her scheduled service activities.

On Thursday, June 7, 2012, Barbara was called Home and given rest by her Lord and Savior. She will always be in the hearts of her family and the many lives she touched along the way. She will truly be missed for the rest of our days.

Two days before Barbara died her beloved sister died, so please pray for her family.

I personally want to give God Honor and Glory for allowing such a Great Lady to live among us.

De Colores! Washington Cursillo® Movement Cursillistas

"Preach all of the time and, only if you need to, Use Words."

This quote given to us by Michael Ciccocioppo during the Sponsors Workshop has many deep meanings relevant to Pre-Cursillo® and the true meaning of selflessness and grace filled sponsorship, making a friend, being a friend and bringing that friend to Christ. We pull people together with commonalities, friendships and then grouping. Words, sales pitches, promises, enthusiasm, hopeful thoughts have little to do with sponsorship and less to do with Cursillo®. Sponsorship is friendship. Friendship is something that is grown over time. The first principle of the Cursillo® is "Make a Friend" and the second is "being a friend" and both must happen before we "bring that friend to Christ".

Sometime similarities cause spontaneous friendships, but unfortunately they are a vast minority when thinking about what really happens when we interact as humans. One of the questions asked during the workshop was about what a sponsor could do during the process of wanting to sponsor someone with respect to how they behave/act. Also do they have what it takes to be a sponsor? The answer is to make a friend by introduction and by your actions. Then live out your true self in your actions.

True self is the self that's defined as the correct one, the truthful one, the one in line with what God placed in each of us, not pretentious, no smoke clouds, just simple grace filled self. The opposite is false self, conscience and unconscious ego, which nurtures a false sense of control and builds a false sense of confidence and false sense of pride. We all have what it takes to be a friend so we all have what it takes to be a sponsor if that is what we desire.

Another question was related to how a sponsor can keep someone interested or for them to continue to want to participate without the sponsor being overbearing or pestering them to attend Cursillo® events.

Build it and they will come. Inform them and let the Holy Spirit take it from there. A quick chat the next time you see them in church, but not every time you see them in church, will do because most of the time you should be a friend not a sponsor. When we take into consideration what the Cursillo® experience really is and understand how we should act, being a friend comes easily. Cursillo® is an encounter with self, an encounter with Christ for three days and finally the fourth day journey which is a lifetime encounter with others.

Sponsorship and introduction to Cursillo® isn't a typical recruiting/sales pressure strategy to fill up a weekend, but it is as simple as knowing when to step back and let the Holy Spirit take over. As a "Babe Chick Pre-Cursillo® Co-Chair" I've come to learn that sometimes the position of Pre-Cursillo® seems to be similar to a gate keeper. Not a GUARD that rigidly lets some in and refuses others, but more as a guide that informs and prepares everyone to enter when certain procedures and etiquette are followed.

My God, my Cursillo® family and friends, have made a profound impression on my life. From my first contact with them, learning about Cursillo®, to every time we gather and group. I pray that this spiritually charged gathering of your Cursillo® children will be mutually encouraged by each other's faith. Blanket us with the Holy Spirit and open our hearts and our minds to accept your grace and wisdom. Make us conduits of your words and tools for your action and continue to gather us for your glory, Amen.
